Patricia Rios is the acting director at El Paso's Chihuahuita Recreation Center, located downtown along the El Paso-Juarez border.

Patty, as she likes to be called, was born in Ciudad Juarez, and moved to El Paso after her second child's birth, to pursue a better education for her children. She is now a single mother of four, with a master's degree in Education from the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP), working for the El Paso Parks and Recreation Department.

Patty was commissioned as a pastor and had started a church in Juarez to where she traveled back and forth between her home in El Paso, but with the increasing violence in Juarez, it has since closed down. She described hearing gunshots two houses down from the church and

how she feels unsafe as a woman to walk around the streets. Years ago, when she was 15, it was safe and common for children to be playing outside on the streets past midnight, but it is not the case anymore.

Patty explained about the prevalent machismo culture in Mexico, and how it has directly affected her own social circle of relatives; she says it's causing women to become victims of domestic violence and increasing the number of single mothers.

Although she is permanently settled in El Paso, she regularly crosses the border to visit her father.




## **Degree of Directness/Importance of Face**
